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# A Letter from Rev. Edie



Rev. Edie Lenz Pastor

This morning I had a conversation with someone working at a call center. As he assisted me in addressing the issue I called about, he asked how our church is managing with all that COVID-19 has brought about. When I shared that we are still worshiping online and that our building has remained closed, he spoke up about how frustrating it is that the church is "closed;" that we are "not allowed" to be open and worship together. It is not my habit to debate or argue with those in customer service, but I just couldn't help myself.


"The church isn't closed. We are simply not meeting together in person for worship." We have not been told we can't meet: we are choosing to meet online out of love and concern for one another. We are free to open the building when we choose, but when we do. it will be out of an abundance of caution. We believe that we are the church in all the places we go, not just when we get together in a building. Maybe I was a bit short with him, maybe I didn't take the time to ask what he meant, maybe he wasn't fishing for a political argument, but I absolutely meant what I said.


WE ARE THE CHURCH. The church, the body of believers, the Bride of Christ, the community of the faithful has never been a building. Yes, we have a building; the church has beautiful buildings. Our building is a convenient meeting place, a place many of us call home and find comfort. This building is a place of worship together, a place we nurture and bless one another, but the building itself is not the church.

**WE** are the church. When you reach out to a neighbor who is in need, offer a hand to help, a listening ear, a voice of hope – you are the church. When you are in the grocery store and pick up extra items for the pantry – you are the church. When you take the time to sit quietly with God, listening for that still small voice – you are the church. When you seek dialogue over debate, understanding over argument; when you speak up for justice in a hard conversation – you are the church. When you set aside your preferences for the sake of another – you are the church. Whenever you choose to speak or act with God at the center and to love your neighbor as you love yourself, you are serving as the church.

In the midst of divisive political debates, challenges of justice, traumatic events raging, the world needs the church. The world needs God's people to "do justice, love kindness, and walk humbly with their God." The world needs people who love their neighbor as they love themselves, who are willing even to "take up their cross and follow." We do this not in posturing and posting on social media, not by arguing and making our case. We do this in action, in the words we speak, in relationship and in community. Yes, the church building is currently closed, but the Church of Christ has never been closed.

People of God, you ARE the church – Go and be the church.

## **Questions for Reflection**

- What is the church? How do you define church?
- Jesus sets out for us high standards on forgiveness in community. What does it really mean to forgive? When have you experienced forgiveness? When have you extended it?
- We often get wrapped up in stories of what is "fair."
   When we read scripture it becomes clear that our human standards and expectations are not God's; how do we learn to see how Jesus sees?
- Faith in action is not only believing, but doing. When
  we "set intention" we make a conscious choice to move
  in a certain direction. Where are you feeling God is
  calling or pushing you? What intentions do you
  need to set?



# Hickory Hills pastor is thrilled with food donations

Edie-Lenz, the pastor of Hickory Hills Presbyterian Church in Hickory Hills, said while COVID-19 has brought uneasiness and misfortune, this is also a time to open up our hearts.

Providing food for those in need while in the midst of the virus can help, the pastor said. That was how the idea of the micro food pantry was created and is located in front of Hickory Hills Presbyterian Church, 8246 W. 95th St.

The idea began during an email committee meeting held on March 28 after the stay-at-home order came from Gov. Pritzker.

"I was aware of micro pantries in other communities," said Lenz, who is in her second year as pastor at the church. "During the email meeting, members of the church discussed the idea and agreed to do it."

The only obstacle now was how

The only obstacle now was how is this going to be done? During the meeting, it was learned that a son of one of the members is a carpenter.

"He agreed to do it and said he could have it up soon," Lenz recalled. "He started working on

it right away and it was up by the end of that Friday."

The wooden cabinet stands just over eight feet and has several shelves to place non-penishable items. The cabinet is filled with many food products. Anyone in need can simply stop by and take what they need, the pastor said.

The pastor added that all that is asked is that if someone takes food that they can also put something in the partny if they are able.

This is free to anyone who is need, she said. Lenz added that personal hygiene items are also available.

The pastor was not initially sure how the idea would progress. However, she found out the answer to that question rather quickly.

"The response has been phenomenal," Lenz said. "We have enough food right now to last a long time. We opened it one day and it was overflowing. So, we

"It's been a dramatic year," Lenz said. "With food pantries being over-run with many new clients, this is a small way of helping relieve some of their burden and help community residents."



# FAITH WALKING FOUNDATIONS BEGINNING THE WEEK OF SEPTEMBER 13, 2020

(Dates and times will be set based on the needs of those signed up.)

Deadline for Registration: September 9

Faith Walking is a spiritual formation process based on the belief that change begins with the individual and ripples out into the world. A process of engagement in personal, small group, and large group transformation, where individuals seek to go deeper in their faith, and join Christ on mission into the world. For any and all adults – we can all benefit from becoming more fully human and more fully alive.

Faith Walking is open to members and nonmembers of HHPC. If you have a friend you would like to invite to join you, please do not hesitate to bring them along.

# What is Faith Walking Foundations?

- Faith Walking Foundations is a 6-module spiritual formation process with the end goal of joining God on mission in the world.
- Faith Walking Foundations is done in one-hour segments over 10 weeks (online or in-person meetings).
- Each Faith Walking Foundations' module follows the same pattern of

learning: you receive information, you receive time and opportunity to reflect on what you are learning, and you are invited to put your learning into practice.

\*If you have completed Module 1, we are looking to begin Module 2 in this same time frame.

Next Step:
Committing to Faith Walking requires two things:

# 1. You need to sign up with Rev. Edie by September 9.

In signing up, you commit to the 10 sessions (missing no more than three sessions) and the associated work. These sessions include four smaller group coaching sessions that may happen at a different time. To get the most out of *Faith Walking*, you must be willing to be fully present and play "full-out."

2. Payment of \$50 for the class should be made payable to *Hickory Hills Presbyterian Church*. This will pay for materials and access to coaches.

\*\* If the cost of this is prohibitive, we will happily cover the cost of your

experience--finances are never intended to get in the way of this process.\*\*

# Topics of the Faith Walking Foundations' Modules

In **Module 1** you will get tools for building self-awareness and self-discovery. You will reflect on both the positive and the negative of your first formation. You will learn how your first formation wounded you and how those wounds are impacting your life. You will learn how to make positive declarations that move your life forward in a healthier direction.

In Module 2 you will learn how shame and your own sense of self-worth are impacting you in negative ways. You will get tools for addressing your shame and for moving beyond it. You will learn that we all live out of three "selves." You will learn how to increasingly live as one integrated self. You will be given tools for sharing your story in life-giving ways. You will learn how to put your negative vows behind you. +
