A Letter from Rev. Edie

Fall is upon us. As I write this the calendar is shifting from summer to fall. The leaves have begun to turn on the edges and soon the oranges, reds, purples. and yellows will dominate. The cooler temperatures have allowed for open windows and have required finding shoes and jackets in our house. The seasons are predictable in their relentlessness: they always come around, the days grow shorter and will eventually grow longer again. Though we do not always pay attention, our lives also have rhythm and pattern to them. Some of these patterns are long-established habits, some are more recent, new things taken on. But whether you are paying attention or not, your patterns are as predicable in you as the seasons are for us.

I have been wondering about these patterns in life, about the ways we just do things. I have also been present to all that has changed this year. There are things that have "always been done that way" that have had to change. There are regular events, programs and patterns in the life of the church that have been interrupted, changed, shifted or outright canceled. Two things about this reality seem really important for us to wonder.

First, it is important to grieve our losses. There are ways of being together. People, events, and even

habits have changed. It doesn't do for us to pretend this is untrue. The grief and emotions attached are real: to pretend or push them away will not be helpful. We need to face the grief, walk through it, name it and allow our hearts to be sad. I mourn my son's 8th grade year and how different this milestone year will be. I grieve those we have lost and been unable to mourn the way we want. I grieve the changes in worship: the separation, masks, lack of song, the missing fellowship. I grieve the usual things that we do in the fall that have been postponed or cancelled. This grief is real and it is important to name it.

Second, grief does not have the final word. In addition to grief, I sense enormous opportunity. There is opportunity for creativity, wonder and imagination. If we need to change what we normally do, what COULD we do? What kind of new opportunities do we have? What new thing could God bring about in us and with us? What challenges can we meet head on because we have a blank slate with which to work? I wonder what we would do if we could do anything? I wonder what we have never imagined because we have been set in an old pattern or season? I wonder what we can reimagine, create, or build?

You see, just as we need to mourn our losses, we need to wonder, what new opportunities exist? Just as we

name our griefs, we also need to be able to wonder, what new thing might come into existence? Rather than waiting for the season to pass, rather than simply waiting for things to become "normal" again, what might we become or do together? I hope you will prayerfully wonder and share what you are seeing, learning, or wondering with the rest of the congregation.

This season is indeed a strange one, but it could be a season of new imagination and creativity.

REFLECTIONS


We are quick to notice the faults and flaws of others, but fail to notice our own. When have you looked clearly at your own behavior, attitude or words? What can you see about where you need to grow?


The sword of the Spirit—God's Word, to some that may seem so absurd. Do not fear, I'm right here. Let my ears hear as others heard.

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN

We seek to continually support *Feed My Starving Children* (FMSC) year-round. FMSC believes hope starts with food. As a Christian nonprofit, FMSC is dedicated to seeing every child whole in body and spirit. FMSC works with food distribution partners that stay with communities for the long haul, empowering them to move from relief to development.

FMSC meals are developed by food science and nutrition professionals to supplement nutritional needs and reduce problems with malnutrition. Nutrition allows children to grow, thrive and develop to their full potential.

Each meal costs less than 25 cents. \$22 feeds one child for 3 months. \$88 feeds one child for a year.

Please search your heart and determine how you can positively impact the life of a child through nutrition.

Donations to support FMSC are accepted at church all year. We pray we will once again be able to personally pack these meals in the future.

FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN (FMSC) EXPANDS ALTERNATIVE PACKING SOLUTIONS

On March 16, for the safety of our volunteers and staff, and in accordance with government guidelines, we made the difficult decision to pause volunteer packing at all FMSC sites and MobilePackTM events. In the weeks since, we have worked diligently to implement alternative packing solutions to allow some meals to continue to be shipped to partners in urgent need.

Bulk Machine Packing

Only nine days after pausing volunteer packing, we launched our first alternative packing solution—a partnership with our vitamin supplier, Karlsburger Foods, Inc., to machine pack meals in bulk. To date, Karlsburger Foods has produced about 6 million meals. Shipments are on their way to Haiti, Nicargua, the Dominican Republic, Burkina Faso and El Salvador.

Only 51 days after stopping volunteer packing, meals have been packed, shipped, cleared customs, and arrived at FMSC food partner Love A Child's warehouse in Haiti. This is a miracle!



Hand Packing

On April 23, we completed our first day of packing meals at Minnesota Correctional Facility-Fairbaut. In the first day and a half, 34,128 meals were packed. Moving forward, offenders housed at the facility will take part in 9 shifts each week, using a special linear packing setup that allows for social distancing.

For several years, FMSC has been partnering with correctional facilities to feed God's kids and feed the spirits of incarcerated individuals.



New Machine Packing

We've reached agreements with two companies, one in Minnesota and one in Utah, to pack one-kilogram (2.2 lb.) bags. Each of these bags holds about 15 meals, compared to 6 meals for each of our stand handpacked bags. These meals will go into production in the coming weeks.


We celebrate progress, but challenges remain.

We have committed to using these alternative methods to pack about 15 meals per month for the next three months. This is about half of what our volunteers pack each month. And each of these meals costs about five cents more per meal than volunteer-packed meals. This will cost an additional \$2.2 million more than volunteer-packed meals over the next three months.

At the same time, the World Food Programme estimates that COVID-19's global impact will double the number of people experiencing severe hunger to 265 million in 2020.

We have seen God's faithfulness through this difficult season and we are humbled by the generosity of FMSC's community of supporters. We continue to ask for your partnership.


