

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Christmas Devotions from Rev. Edie

In place of my monthly letter, please enjoy the following Christmas devotions written by Greg Town and I, followed by some selected poems. May God's love and peace be with you all during Christmastime and through the New Year.

Child-like?

Text: Matt. 18:1-5 Beloved Children by Greg Town

I know very few adults who wouldn't bristle if another called them a child or childish. It would certainly heighten my defensiveness and cause me to hear little of what the other would have to add. Being child-like wouldn't seem to rise to the surface as a trait among church and community leaders, yet throughout Scripture God's people are referred to as children of God. And we're told by Christ that unless we change and become like a child, we will not enter the Kingdom of Heaven. We're also told to put aside our childish ways and live in maturity and love (such as 1 Cor. 13 and 1 John 3).

The mixture of God's Word shows us the ways of being child-like without being childish. We are guided into the recognition of our ability, capacity, and calling to act out of thoughtfulness, maturity, wisdom, and love rather than out of our childish reactivity (like conflict, distancing, blaming, etc). We are shown again and again that God's people are to remain centered in a child-like humility, as we look to God for provision and love.

And perhaps that is what it means to be a child of God as an adult who is called to lead within Christ's Church, to center ourselves always in the love and care of God, just as my own children come to me when they are hungry or hurt or in need of something they know they cannot obtain without the care of a loving parent. Unless we start inlove and in our belovedness in God, our work and our being will bemisguided by self-ambition, pride, and shame.

In what ways do you remain connected to your belovedness? When do you find it most difficult to say that you are God's beloved child? What could it mean for you to remember you are God's beloved child, at all times, through all things?

The work of the Spirit's transformation in Christ and our work as leaders is remaining child-like while also growing in maturity. Whatbetter season than Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany to surface the child within us, in all the belovedness, wonder, vulnerability, and courage of a child!

BELOVED IS WHERE WE BEGIN

If you would enter into the wilderness, do not begin without a blessing. Do not leave without hearing who you are: Beloved, named by the One who has traveled this path before you. Do not go without letting it echo in your ears, and if you find it is hard to let it into your heart, do not despair. That is what this journey is for.

I cannot promise this blessing will free you from danger, from fear, from hunger or thirst, from the scorching of sun or the fall of the night. But I can tell you that on this path there will be help. I can tell you that on this way there will be rest. I can tell you that on this way there will be rest. I can tell you that you will know the strange graces that come to our aid only on a road that fly to meet us bearing comfort and strength, that come alongside us for no other cause than to lean themselves toward our ear and with their curious insistence whisper our name:

Beloved. Beloved.

Child-like?

Text: Matt. 18:1-5 Courageous Like Children by Rev. Edie Lenz

My son LOVES American Ninja Warrior. If you are unfamiliar with the TV show, it is an obstacle course competition involving feats of physical endurance and strength I didn't know were possible for the human body. My son spends hours in our basement hanging from the rafters and learning to swing and jump from one thing to another. In his Ninja classes he takes at a gym centered around these obstacles, he delights in any new obstacle introduced, anything that allows him to challenge himself, try something new, stretch the limits of what he thinks he can do. He is fearless in his willingness to take on new challenges. He often falls the first few times, crashing down onto the mats placed over the floors. But I have never seen any kid at the gym fail to jump up and try again.

It can be challenging as adults to try new things, particularly in public; we don't like to fail, we don't like to look foolish. We don't want to fall on the first 16 tries. This level of self-consciousness is virtually absent in children; it is something they seem to learn as they grow. We all learned to walk, talk, write, read, etc. by failing and trying again. Children are constantly learning, constantly risking getting it wrong, making a mistake, having to start over. As adults, perhaps particularly as leaders, we long to insulate ourselves from this kind of courageous experimentation. We become cautious, overly concerned with looking competent and capable. As leaders, we want to appear to have it together – who will trust us if we don't?

But change cannot happen without risk, as leaders we are tasked with the need to lead forward, into new directions, to seek the calling of God. This cannot be done from a place of caution; we are to be courageous like children: willing to try, and try again, willing to learn as we go.

We must grow our courage muscles to try new things AND perhaps more importantly to be able to reflect on what we tried. Like my son, analyzing why he fell on that new obstacle and trying it a bit differently the next time —we, as leaders, are to reflect on what has been tried, what has been learned and what can be gleaned to move forward in courageous possibility.

A BLESSING FOR NEW BEGINNINGS

In out-of-the-way places of the heart, where your thoughts never think to wander, this beginning has been quietlyforming, waiting until you were ready to emerge.

For a long time it has watched your desire, feeling the emptiness growing inside you, noticing how you willed yourself on, still unable to leave what you had outgrown.

It watched you play with the seduction of safety and the gray promises that sameness whispered, heard the waves of turmoil rise and relent, wondered would you always live like this.

Then the delight, when your courage kindled and out you stepped onto new ground, your eyes young again with energy and dream. A path of plenitude opening before you.

Though your destination is not yet clear you can trust the promise of this opening; unfurl yourself into the grace of beginning that is at one with your life's desire.

Awaken your spirit to adventure, Hold nothing back, learn to find ease in risk; soon you will be home in a new rhythm, for your soul senses the world that awaits you. Christmas Devotions from Rev. Edie (cont'd. from p. 3.)

Child-like?

Text: Matt. 18:1-5 Curiosity and Wonder of Children by Greg Town

I'm hoping you've had the joy of sitting with an inquisitive 3- or 4- year-old, being peppered with all sorts of questions, some with simple answers and some that would leave even an astrophysicist scratching their head. Or perhaps you've been able to visit a museum, a zoo, or a festival or fair with a child, and experienced thewide-eyed wonder that occurs when one must take in the biggest and smallest of details.

Somewhere in our youth, most individuals lose that innate sense of wonder and curiosity. We stop asking questions. We stop seeing all the parts of our world and ourselves with wide-eyed wonder. We begin to think we know enough to get through life. When we're anxious, curiosity is often the first thing to be silenced within us, as we jump to defensiveness, easy answers, and quick-fixes.

I've visited the same museums and zoos multiple times with my own children. Very little has changed in these places over the years, yet my children are always excited to go again, because they know there's something they missed before. I used to find myself reluctantly accompanying them on subsequent visits, wondering why on earth we're going to the same place again, yet somewhere along the way the Spirit challenged me to take on my children's joy, to join in their curiosity, and to connect with the awe they have at all manner of things. This practice, as a parent, has overflowed into other areas of my life - my calling and career, my church and community, my inner self and my relationships. I've begun to allow wonder to have its way, to connect with and express awe, to remain curious and ask questions, and especially to do this when anxiety is high in myself and others.

How might your leadership and relationships change if you started asking more questions and sought a deeper and more genuine curiosity with those around you?

How have you seen curiosity influencing other leadership traits in yourself, like creativity, hopefulness, compassion, and empowerment?

The invitation of Christ, the work of the Spirit, and the call to leadership often means reconnecting with and rekindling the child-like curiosity and wonder.

HELP ME UNBURY WONDER

O God of the miracles, of galaxies, and crocuses, and children, I praise you now from the soul of the child within me, shy in my awe, delighted by my foolishness, stubborn in my wanting, persistent in my questioning, and bold in asking you to help me unbury my talents for wonder and humor and gratitude, so I may invest them eagerly in the recurring mysteries of spring and beginnings, of willows that week and rivers that flow and people who grow in such endlessly amazing and often painful ways; and I will be forever linked and loyal to justice and joy, simplicity and humanity, Christ and his kingdom.

Child-like?

Text: Matt. 18:1-5 Vulnerable as Children by Rev. Edie Lenz

Children are often referred to as "vulnerable." By this we usually mean that they are in need of care, protection, nurture, and "scaffolding" to help them thrive. Children don't inherently know who is safe, what is good for them, or how to navigate the world –for that they need wise, loving, and dedicated guides. When we love our children well, we don't control every moment of their being, we don't do all things for them – rather we invite their curiosity, playfulness, and let them learn. As leaders we often find ourselves hit by the reality – we don't always know what to do, where we should go, or how we are going to get there. In this admission is a vulnerability that is often uncomfortable and deeply challenging, but lies at the heart of who we are called by Christ to be.

Brené Brown writes of vulnerability as "uncertainty, risk, and emotional exposure. But vulnerability is not weakness; it's our most accurate measure of courage. When the barrier is our beliefabout vulnerability, the question becomes: "Are we willing to show up and be seen when we can't control the outcome?" –

Brené Brown, Braving the Wilderness: The Quest for True Belonging and the Courage to Stand Alone

Jesus invites us to become like children: to be vulnerable. As leaders, we are invited into the risk and uncertainty of not having all the answers, needing to learn new things, needing partners and new ways of thinking. This vulnerability flies in the face of what we often hold up as "good leadership"; the leader on a pedestal, the person with the answers, the charismatic leader who knows exactly what to do. But, uncertainty, risk, and the possibility of emotional exposure – these are the makings of a Christ-like leader.

In the face of overwhelming change in the past 2 years, leading a small congregation I often feel the vulnerability of not having the answers. I have a lot of questions, but not the answers. To sit with my leaders and say, "I don't know." is at once deeply vulnerable and deeply freeing. Reality is —I don't know, I don't have the answers for our future but I am committed to deep discernment, prayer, and wondering together. Is it frightening? Yes. Uncertain? Absolutely. Faithful? I am committed to finding out.

VULNERABILITY

Vulnerability is not a weakness, a passing indisposition, or something we can arrange to do without, vulnerability is not a choice, vulnerability is the underlying, ever present and abiding undercurrent of our natural state.

To run from vulnerability is to run from the essence of our nature, the attempt to be invulnerable is the vain attempt to become something we are not, and most especially, to close off our understanding of the grief of others. More seriously, in refusing our vulnerability we refuse the help needed at every turn of our existence and immobilize the essential, tidal and conversational foundations of our identity.

To have a temporary, isolated sense of power over all events and circumstances, is a lovely illusionary privilege and perhaps the prime and most beautifully constructed conceit of being human and especially of being youthfully human, but it is a privilege that must be surrendered with that same youth, with ill health, with accident, with the loss of loved ones who do not share our untouchable powers; powers eventually and most emphatically given up, as we approach our last breath.

The only choice we have as we mature is how we inhabit our vulnerability, how we become larger and more courageous and more compassionate through our intimacy with disappearance, our choice is to inhabit vulnerability as generous citizens of loss, robustly and fully, or conversely, as misers and complainers, reluctant and fearful, always at the gates of existence, but never bravely and completely attempting to enter, never wanting to risk ourselves, never walking fully through the door.


Our continuing collection of hats, gloves, mittens, and scarves has been wonderful! Thank you for your generosity!

We finished the stories in the book, *She Is Called: Women of the Bible.*


Here is what we learned:




