A Letter from Rev. Edie

This past Friday ABC Chicago ran another story on the loneliness epidemic sweeping our country. This is not a new story, in the wake of 2020, but even before there were growing concerns about isolation, disconnection, and "false intimacy". What researchers and mental health providers have been warning us over and over again is that our society is more and more isolated, less and less meaningfully connected; this leads to a host of mental health and potentially physical ailments as time goes on. Essentially, though we can connect through devices and screens to anyone, anywhere in the world in a moment; this is not the same as meaningful connection. Thousands of followers or "friends" on social media are not the same as meaningful relationships. Human beings are wired for and need meaningful (and face to face) connection to thrive and the two most vulnerable populations are the elderly and teens.

We know this, I have even written about this before, but something about their story struck me in a new way. The focus of this story (the link is at the end if you want to watch it) was on the increase in participation in organizations like running clubs and other gatherings of people for a shared purpose onto which friendships, fellowship, and connection can be added. What struck me as I watched is that THIS is the work of the church throughout history. The church has been and should be a place where different people come together for a common purpose (worship, discipleship, faith) but find within that gathering connections, meaningful relationships, mutual encouragement, and (if I can draw the direct connection) a less lonely existence. I found myself wanting to interrupt the reporter, to say "but we DO that over here." But of course, you can't do that on a news snippet. But also, it has me wondering, how well DO we do that? And when I wonder about the "we" do I mean HHPC or the church as a whole?



As I have reflected further, what I know is that I cannot in any meaningful way impact "the church" across North America (I simply don't have or want that platform). So, I think the "we" I want to wonder with is you. How are you doing with a sense of disconnection or loneliness? How could we as a people do a better job of addressing that for you? What about our neighbors, the strangers who live around the church, the people you've lived next door to for years and only even waved at? Are they lonely? How would we begin to know?

HHPC is a congregation that treats one another like a family; HHPC is a congregation that does a good job of welcoming strangers into our community – if they come here first. But I wonder, do our neighbors know they are welcome here? Beyond our beautiful electric sign, how else could we invite neighbors or acquaintances into our gathered community? If loneliness is the epidemic we're told it is, how can we as God's people take active steps to bring about a more connected world? What has to change in us? What would need to change in how we do things? Is this something God could be giving us to do? And if so, where and how might we begin to listen to the call of God for our neighbors and those we do not know yet?

Mission in Action

Mission Committee Report Dave Delaney

On August 10 several of us participated in a mobile pack for FMSC at Saint Mary's Orthodox Church in Palos Heights. Andrew Witek, a glutton for service, attended the Friday evening session as well as the two sessions on Saturday. A total of 101,088 meals were packed which translates into 217 kids fed for an entire year. Future plans for upcoming FMSC packs include November at Christ Church in Oak Brook (dates and times to be determined) and another Feed The Need on March 1-2, 2025 (presumably at Illinois Benedictine, times not yet determined).

Plans have been made to attach labels to our supply of prayer shawls and other items. We have over 100 of these items, so get your thread and needles ready. When they are ready they will be delivered to Bella Terra in La Grange. That is where Gert Vickers spent most of her last days.

November brings us to supporting Elsie's pantry. Once again this year we want to provide needed items for this worthwhile endeavor. A list of needed items will be available. At the same time we should not forget our own micro pantry.

We will contact the Jones Center as to what they want from us this year. Two years ago it was blankets and last year it was board games. Items intended for their dime store will be taken to the center at the appropriate time. Arrangements for Breakfast with Santa will be handled through Mission Council 8.





Musicians Corner

A Church Musician You Should Know—Part 1 by Greg Rolla

Andrae Crouch (1942-2015) was an American gospel singer, arranger, record producer and pastor. Known as the father of modern gospel music, his best known songs are; "The Blood Will Never Lose it's Power", "My Tribute', and "Soon and Very Soon". He also collaborated on recordings with popular artists Stevie Wonder, DeBarge, and Chaka Khan. Artists who have recorded his songs include; Bob Dylan, Elvis Presley, Barbara Mandrell, Little Richard, Michael Jackson, and Elton John.

Andrae and his twin sister, Sandra, were born in San Francisco to Benjamin and Caterine Crouch. Their father was a minister in the Church of God in Christ in Pacoma, California. His parents later owned both a dry cleaners and a restaurant in Los Angeles. The Crouch's also had a street preaching ministry and Benjamin worked as chaplain in both a hospital and prison

Andrae was encouraged to learn the piano at an early age and began playing and singing at the age of nine during his father's church services. At 14 he wrote his first gospel song, "The Blood Will Never Lose its Power". It was recorded on his first album in 1968, featuring jazz pianist Billy Preston. He appeared with his gospel group "The Disciples" on the Johnny Carson Tonight Show in 1972, and twice at Carnegie Hall in 1975 and 1979.

Crouch had a significant influence on contemporary Christian music during the 1970's - 1980's and bridged the gap between black and white Christian music. In 1996 he was honored on the Grammy Award winning CD *Tribute: The Songs of Andrae Crouch*.

Towards the end of his life, he suffered from various health problems. In 2015 he suffered a fatal heart attack. He was 72. Crouch never married or had any children. He remained very close to his sister and his family. His songs can be found in hymnals of many Christian denominations throughout the world.
