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A Letter from Rev. Dr. Edie Lenz

⊛THANK YOU! ↔

On Tuesday, March 25 I defended my dissertation and received my Doctor of Ministry degree. While we will also attend my hooding and graduation ceremonies in June, my degree has been officially conferred. And this is where I get to say, I literally could not have done this without you. This journey began at the beginning of 2021 with tons of reading and reflection. Every time I went out to CA for a week of learning, you prayed, took care of the work here at the church, and created space for me to be away. Every time I returned I did so with homework – of course a paper to write but also a work that was centered on you, work I needed you to do with me. You have filled out surveys, participated in conversations, given feedback on my writing, and answered question after question. I cannot thank you enough for all you have done to help me through this process.

In a month or so, a bound copy of my dissertation will be available in the church library for anyone who wants to read the full document. It will also be available online in the Fuller Seminary library. My dissertation, entitled: "Joy in the Mourning: Thriving in a Ministry of Loss" is an exploration of grief in churches. Every church I have ever served has gone through a lot and has carried old wounds. My working theory is that until we, as God's people, learn to grieve together, in community, we will remain stuck and unable to imagine a more hopeful future.

I explored this theory through the lens of closing a church, merging two congregations, and walking with a church that has endured a lot of loss. In this theory I explored tools of mourning, ways we can gather and grieve together; some of them you might recognize because you helped me test them. I also look at the pastor; what work does a pastor need to do for him or herself to remain healthy, engaged, and doing their own internal work as well as serving the church and walking with people. I reflected on my own journey in ministry as well as all I have learned from these very different congregations.

When I started in ministry, more than 20 years ago I intended to be done with school. I love learning but I had no further academic ambitions. But I kept learning, and I kept finding myself in places where I had to learn new tools to keep the congregations moving forward and learning together. These past six years (did you know we are at six years this month?) and the past four as I have been walking through this degree have been a blessing – I have learned things I never imagined I would need to learn, and I have been richly blessed.

Thank you for being my learning partners, for humoring me when I needed you do to another set of questions and for cheering me on in my learning. It is a privilege to serve as your pastor and a joy to be able to celebrate with you crossing the finish line. Thank you, thank you, thank you.

Please let the office know if you wish to assist with any of our Discipleship activities. We will likely be able to find something for you. Again, Happy Spring! See you soon!




Mission Committee Report by Dave Delaney

In the Blues Brothers movie Dan Ackroyd and Jim Belushi declared they were on a mission from God. We at HHPC may not be on the same kind of mission, but we have many activities that can be considered missions. Several of us participated in the FEED THE NEED pack for Feed My Starving Children. The goal set for that pack of 800,000 meals was met. We try to attend a FMSC pack every 3 months or so. We continue to support our mini pantry which is still in constant use. The free will offerings, either money donations or food donations, collected at the Wednesday Lenten dinners will go to support our mini pantry. In November we collect food for Elsie's pantry. Our tree of warmth is usually overloaded with all kinds of cold weather items. We collect funds for disaster relief in North Carolina, and California, wherever there is a need.

The money we collect for the One Great Hour of Sharing campaign will go in some manner to disaster relief. The plastic caps we collect keeps that plastic material out of landfills and gets recycled into something useful and long lasting (e.g., picnic tables and benches). Our collecting of pop tabs helps recycle the aluminum they are made from.

I am sure many of us make private donations to many worthwhile organizations throughout the year. I encourage everyone to maintain that level of giving if at all possible. My personal donation is to volunteer and donate funds and items that can be used by Hearts In Motion in their thrift store or shipped to Guatemala. There are any number of organizations, too many to list, that anybody can donate either time or money. All of this should be considered a mission for God.





The Old Rugged Cross: A Hymn First Sung in Three Places

The Old Rugge

Approximately a hundred years ago, an evangelist, George Bennard, came to Sturgeon Bay, Wisconsin to direct a revival at Sawyer Friends Church which, by the way, still stands today. He was well known throughout the area for his singing and preaching. He carried a Bible and a guitar wherever he went, and wrote many hymns-both words and music.

George grew up in Youngstown, Ohio, the son of a coal miner. As a teenager he worked in the coal mines to support his mother and sisters after his father's death. He eventually became involved in the Salvation Army and married fellow army worker, Arminta Beeler, in 1894. The couple rented an apartment near the Methodist College in Albion, Michigan. From there, George travelled throughout the Midwest bringing the Gospel message wherever he went.

In 1912, he began working on a hymn about the meaning of the cross of Christ. He titled this hymn "The Old Rugged Cross", and he first performed it at the initial revival in Sturgeon Bay. From there he travelled to Pokagon, Michigan where, at the Frist Methodist Episcopal Church, the hymn was sung by a choir.

For approximately a hundred years, three places have claimed "The Old Rugged Cross" as their own. In Albion, there is a plaque that says: "The Old Rugged Cross", one of the world's best-loved hymns, was composed here in 1912. In Sturgeon Bay, the Friends Community Church maintains a beautiful garden with a cross commemorating the first singing of the hymn there. In Pokagon, there is another garden and marker claiming to be the birtplace of the hymn.

Due to his wife's delicate health, the family moved to Redondo Beach, California where Bennard continued to write hymns-three hundred in all. In 1958, a reporter from the Los Angeles Times interviewed him about the famous hymn he wrote. "I was going through a terrible time in my life," he said. "I needed help. Then I remembered an old wooden cross I had once seen. The first ten words came to me: 'On a hill faaway stood an old wooden cross.' It must have been two weeks before I finished it."

During this Lenten and Easter season, may we reflect on the meaning of the cross in our own lives-

So I'll cherish the old rugged cross,

Till my trophies at last I lay down;

I will cling to the old rugged cross,

And exchange it someday for a crown.
